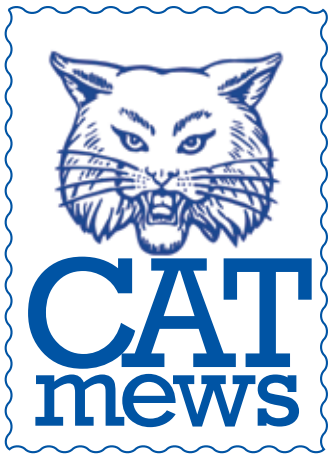

How a Starving Artist Finds the Buffet

Did you ever see Annie? Remember the tiny character role of the girl who gets off the bus who "just got here this morning?" She sings for approximately fifteen seconds out of the entire show about arriving in New York and says, "Three bucks, two bags, one me." As odd as it may sound, that's what my arrival in New York was like. Of course, it sounds a little bit different on a rainy day in LaGuardia. There's a lot less singing involved.

When I left DC for New York, I knew that the change wouldn't be easy. It's no secret that New York is one of the most expensive cities in America. That, I can attest to personally. It seems that every apartment costs exponentially more than the last and has less living space than the average closet. Finding a job seems even harder. Every day, I'm out pounding the pavement looking for a job or a gig or anything to keep me going. You wouldn't believe how hard it is to convince a restaurant that a working actor is worth their time.

And don't even get me started on auditions. At least a few times a week, I stand around for hours at a time only to be seen for thirty seconds and leave for the day. If you don't know what

being "typed" is, it's probably one of the most psychologically wrenching experiences known to the acting community. I waited in line for four hours at Jersey Boys before I stood in a room for a fifteen second introduction and was told to have a nice day because I didn't have the look. That's a day that will mess with your head.

Yet, with all of the struggle and heartache that comes with being in New York, it really is one of the most thrilling adventures of my life. There's a buzz and a rhythm to the city that resonates somewhere deep within me. It makes my heart beat a little faster, my strut a little funkier, and my singing a little louder. I love to look down any street in New York because to me, every corner looks like a postcard waiting for someone to take the picture.

Even going to auditions that fail gives me a sense of purpose out here. Every opening door into an audition brings exhilaration. Singing alongside other artistically gifted people, waiting for your turn, belting out to the rafters, and anticipating a return for your hard efforts makes me feel good about what I do in this business. Joy mixed with heartache is what working in theatre is all about and New



York has that in spades.

Theatricals aside, I am amazed at everything this city has to offer. I truly feel as though I sit in the heart of a bohemian world. So much art that I can barely comprehend is born right here and I get the chance to experience it first-hand. Poetry readings, art gallery openings, performance art, interactive theatre, sidewalk chalk paintings, contemporary concerts, and amateur talent competitions make up the tiniest fraction of the art waiting to be witnessed. It's a comforting feeling to know that I can find all sorts of artistic endeavors right outside my door.

And so, day in and day out, I rouse myself out of bed and begin again diving headfirst into the fray to do everything I can to create the art I've always dreamed of making. The work is tough and the pay is little but I know that it is all worth it because in the end, every day for me in New York is like that singular girl singing in Annie; wide-eyed, hopeful, and new.

I feel very fortunate to have the work I have thus far having already sung a concert version of *Ragtime*, played an extra on *Smash*, and taken part in a staged reading of a new musical. I'm almost ready to open up *Showgirls* the musical down in the village and after that I'll begin rehearsals for a musical version of *Madame Bovary*. Every opportunity is a blessing and I couldn't be happier to have them.

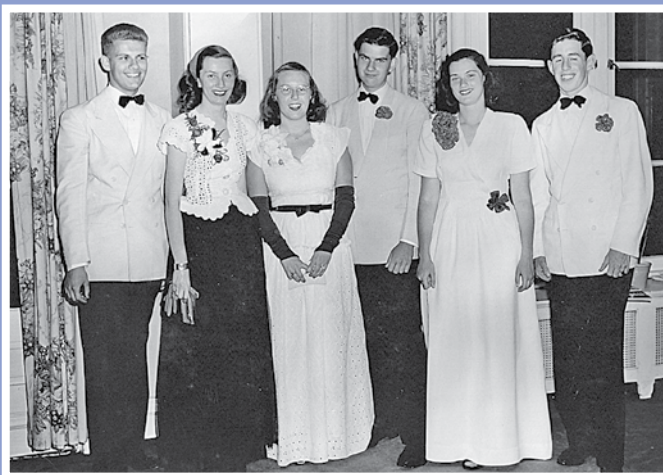

This photograph shows GHHS L.A.L. Sorority sisters and their dates at the L.A.L. Commencement Formal on June 4, 1946. They are identified as: Gene Garner, Ann Gebhardt, Jinny Titus, Al Hunt, Joyce Jones and Bill Merrick. The photograph is from the Joyce Jones Alibrando collection. An admission ticket that Joyce saved indicates that the formal started at 10:00pm and ended at 1:00am and was held at the Columbus Country Club with music provided by Don Crawford's Orchestra. The cost was \$2.00 couple or \$1.00 stag. L.A.L. was one of three sororities at Grandview Heights High School. It was founded in 1922 and lasted until 1960 when state law prohibited high school fraternities and sororities.

RUSH HOURS

Local radio traffic announcer Johnny Hill keeps the city moving smoothly

You hear Johnny Hill's voice streaming from the dial during your daily commute, shepherding you from crashes, congestion and construction. Employed by Clear Channel, Hill studies local road cams and traffic data to compile drive-time updates picked up by a handful of local stations including QFM96 and Magic 106.3. Jovial and quick-witted, the reporter shared how he keeps Columbus from on-the-go annoyance.

“I didn't think this job would last six months. Now it's 10 years later.”

I've wanted to be on the radio ever since I was a kid. I had a little transistor radio. I thought the disc jockeys were cool, and I wanted to be that cool.

It was mostly jock work for a dozen years out of college. I started at Ohio University.

I ended up in Marysville, in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, and back here in Columbus.

I thought that's what I always would be doing, but things changed. So I quit trying to control things. I didn't think this job would last six months. Now it's 10 years later.

I get up about 4:45 a.m. The first report is done just before 6 o'clock. I can guarantee you a couple of spots will get heavy every morning at about the same time, almost like clock-work—70 West at Miller/Kelton between 6:30 and 7, 71 North between Frank Road and Downtown around 7 o'clock. But, otherwise, it is never the same job twice.

The toughest part of the job is stopping myself from putting in too much information. I feel like I have to do as much as I can, and some stations require me to do it in 30 seconds and not much more. I have more than once given the wrong outcue for the station I'm on.

The key to not being annoyed in traffic: Let it go. I guess that's part of my job—to make it easier. I can't take away the

accidents, but if I can take away the anxiety, then I've done my job right.
