I am certain I am only lending one voice to the thank you I hope you and your 'team' are receiving for your continued efforts to keep our class connected. I am always amazed when reading the Skyline News Note at all the information you have gathered.

As I've gotten older, I do think more and more about our time together growing up. We just didn't realize how important those years were at the time. We were so busy with the business of being students, that we never fully realized how precious life was and how formative those years were in setting the groundwork for who we would become, or could become. I feel as though I've had such a wonderful window into what we may have been like then, with now my nearly 40 years of teaching high school students.

Some memories of our high school days loom large, while other things I am reminded of by someone else. When I think that we, our class, have been connected by something pretty special it does make me take pause. How lucky we were to have been brought up in the 60's with so many amazing things happening around us, historical things. I used to ask my high schools students that if they could choose another time to live, when would that be? Overwhelmingly kids look to the 60's and dream/think about what they have heard. We took that for granted. I love that we had typewriters and no computers, phones that dialed (KE31225) numbers, and not cell phones that many of us have become addicted to. I love that our parents (and yes, many of us had two that we lived with) would send us outside to play after school or on a week-end, and we breathed mostly fresh air... explored the East Oakland Hills, and that walking places was the norm. Mom had home cooked meals, and I can't remember eating out at all. Anyway, it

was a time I remember fondly, though there was angst, too, about boyfriends, facing our own trials of being a teen, and wondering where we would be in 10-20 years, let along 50 years.

I am very sad for those who cannot look on their lives as being blessed. I know that not everyone can. I've had my share of bad experiences including death, divorce, rape, incest, losing family and friends, failing at things, navigating suicide, losing a job... and some of those things were not my experiences but ones I lived through with students, siblings, parents, friends... etc. Nonetheless, and as I've advised my own high school kids, I always tried to share personal stories to help kids navigate life, and to let them know that the moment may seem not worth living, but life is that journey of walking both smooth and rocky paths, with many forks in the road (love **Yogi Berra**: '**When you come** to the **fork in the road**, take it!'), and how you handle those times makes you who you are, and is how your character develops.

I have regrets and a never ending bucket list, but I also send thanks into the universe every day for having been here at all, and trying to do good where I can. I am reminded, as I engage daily with my beautiful granddaughters, that we still have great value. So what if we are in our 70's, there is still lots of life to live, and by golly I'm gonna go out with a full list of things yet to do.

An important lesson I've learned from my granddaughters is to look at the world through the eyes of a child. If you do, you will want to play more and everything you see will be in the most vivid of colors. I so wish I could go back to my high school years knowing what I know now. I would not have wasted so much time on things that didn't matter, and I'd love people more and open my eyes and heart to all the possibilities and the opportunities we were afforded growing up in the Bay Area.

Do I miss the Bay??? Damn right. Idaho has been great for raising my own four children with meeting by wonderful husband. And my teaching career has been unbelievable. However, I will always be an Oakland girl at heart. So to all of us that lived that time together, though we are in touch rarely, and there are people we've forgotten or lost contact with, it was that time together that also has figured into our lives, our journeys, our stories. We shared and experienced, quite by accident (or maybe grand design),

something as important as our DNA we received by accident. So as we wind down... as we lose our classmates... let us always celebrate what we shared. For that I am blessed beyond words.
