I thought I would share my husband's covid journey.



My husband, Glenn. has COPI

Glenn, has COPD. So, when he developed a bad cough I brought him to the ER, here in Grants Pass on February first.

He tested positive and they sent him home. After four days he was worse so we returned and they admitted him to the hospital.

He was diagnosed with afib. He never developed a secondary infection so did not have covid medication. He developed different covid symptoms and was kept several days.

He was then sent to a covid rehabilitation unit at a convalescent facility in Medford. I was thankful that there was an opening in Medford as the next such facility was in Roseburg.

He was sent home from there last week on the 23rd.

He is responding well to heart medication. I monitor his blood pressure now to make sure that the



I have learned about some fabulous technology

that may help people you know... and maybe someday you. These are products to help people who have low vision or are blind. Why should you read it? Because your friends or family may not get help from their health plan. My close relative April became legally blind 18 years ago, and Kaiser offered no help with her adjustment. There should have been a social worker to tell her about programs and products. April connected with Lighthouse for the Blind, but as a low vision person didn't fit with their programs.

And you may soon know someone with problems. One-third of diabetics over 75 show signs of diabetic retinopathy. I have two friends with age-related macular degeneration, which affects 12% of people over 80. They are under 80. Because we are living longer, macular degeneration is expected to double in 30 years.

Our classmate, **Nick Blackshere**, is

medication for his heart is working and to see if adjustments may need to be made.

I could not visit him through all this, of course. We did try one window visit through a sliding glass door that had been treated with reflective material which meant we couldn't see each other!! They did provide him his own phone and phone number, so phone calls had to suffice.

I have remained well and we are still working our way through his recovery. He is very weak and occasionally seems disoriented.

He will continue physical therapy at home and nurse visits until he is better. His primary doctor is happy with his progress.

That's it so far.

I enjoy reading the news that is shared every month.

Thank you to everyone who contributes and helps get it out to us.

For my birthday, I am driving to the pharmacy of a grocery store that I have never been in and to a town I have never been in the 46 years I have lived in MN. This travel is to get my first dose of Covid vaccine! Score!

A day later: Who would have thought grocery stores would have appointments available before my health care provider. I even was notified today I got into the state reconnected with Nick on the Zoom video calls. Nick, who is blind, had a similar experience with Kaiser, but he got help from the Veterans Administration.

A problem with tech is you have to ask questions and have someone to ask. Like "Is there a product that can help me match my jackets, tops and skirts?" April lost her color vision as well as becoming low vision. She and I had many sessions with her extensive wardrobe.

Nick told me about Colorino.

Press this little machine on an object, and it will tell you the color from its list of 150 shades. Nick uses it to be sure he is using the right garbage can as the blue, black and green are all the same size. I am relieved because April remembers buying most of these items and would ask me "Is this magenta?" I couldn't tell her whether some items was burgundy, magenta or maroon without pawing through clothes catalogs to find color lists.

Another important question Nick always asks about products "Will it do anything else?" Checking Colorino out for this article I discovered it will also detect the presence of light and identify proximity and intensity by audio signal.

Even when I know what to ask, I sometimes get the answers wrong. Nick recommended a phone app called "Be My Eyes", and I was sure he said it only worked with Apple. But I looked it up for this article, and there is an Android version. Volunteers will help you find things you have dropped on the floor or

Congratulations to **Sue Girton Glanville** who is formally "retired" and finding out she's busier than

someone has moved on your counter. The app calls the volunteer who uses your smartphone's camera to "see.. Both Nick and April use the National Library Service which provides free audio books and braille books. It also will provide a playback machine or you can download books onto your equipment. My sister did get some help at her federal job. They provided her a text reader called Jaws, which Nick says is a good program. "Say When Liquid Level Indicator" is an under \$20 device using a 9 volt battery to announce when your cup is full. Handy if you are blind and want to pour yourself a cup of coffee.

To make walking safer Miniguide lets you know when you are approaching objects or people. It can be set for 2 ft. to 25 ft. This means if you are walking a narrow sidewalk planted with trees you can have warning. It uses ultrasonic echo-location. April says she can't hear electric cars approach they are so quiet; perhaps the Mini-guide would help.

April's biggest problem is going new places. Sometimes the Paratransit bus can't drop her right where she needs to go, and then she may need to wait for help. The Victor Reader-Trek is a two-function machine It is both a GPS and an audio-book player. The Trek can tell you're your current nearest address, the direction you are travelling, describe the next intersection, and the next instructions if you are following a route. It can access European maps, too!

With her low vision, April has to write phone numbers, reminders, etc. in large letters on an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper which end up in a large pile that she is always going through. Milestone is a recording product that could help her with reminders and information she wants to remember like dates and telephone numbers or books she wants to listen to. Most recording devices go sequentially, so to find something you have to play from the beginning. Milestone can be set up with files which it will announce if you are searching. It is small enough to wear on a lanyard around you.

My great grandfather was the donor of the largest amount by an individual to Tung Wah Dispensary and latter, in the 1920's a major donor to the new Chinese Hospital.

When Chinese immigrants came to help build California in the latter part of 19th century, epidemics of smallpox and cholera stalked the Bay Area. Locals officials commonly blamed outbreaks on the inhabitants of San Francisco's Chinatown. They also withheld health services from the community and raised the costs of treating Chinese patients at municipal hospitals. **In response, the diaspora organized and built their own**. Tung Wah Dispensary, America's first Chinese-American medical facility, opened its doors in 1900. Later renamed Chinese Hospital, it remains the only independent hospital run by the Chinese community in the U.S., with a dozen locations across the San Francisco peninsula. <u>Atlas Obscura</u> recalled the history last April.


