Zoom Recap of May 9, 2022

Travel was the first major topic, with Susan planning a trip to Dubai, Abu Dhabi and Jordan (her daughter is involved with Teachers on the Move - a longterm subbing group). 
Gay Parker becoming a Mouseketeer!

For Memorial Day

Vietnam still haunts our generation. I became "awakened" to vets and their experiences and problems

after Carol Szymkiewicz presented a tribute for vets from our class at the 50th reunion. And I decided to re-think everything I had thought about soldiers and those who went to Vietnam.

Sometimes I think about what coming home from Vietnam to the liberal, mostly antiwar Bay Area was like for vets. Shad Meshad, who served in Vietnam as a psychiatric social worker and later founded the National Veterans Foundation, describes coming home as follows: "Those were dark times, shadowed by what we'd seen and done in the war. Some vets brought all that horror home, re-living it, episode by episode, riding that long escalator down into despair and chronic homelessness."

A friend of mine told me when he came back from Vietnam and looked into the mirror, he saw a difference in his eyes. They were the eyes of someone indoctrinated in basic training to kill on command. And when he was out in the jungle, it was killed or be killed. An innocence was gone that he would never be able to get back. I will not forget his story about the soldiers who cut off enemy soldiers' ears for souvenirs. To understand basic training, he recommends the movie "Full Metal Jacket."

There are several major problems still experienced by Vietnam vets. Some are among the more than 6,000 veterans per year who commit suicide. Of those, 70% never asked for help from the Veterans Administration.

Homelessness of vets is a second problem troubling our country. A major factor is probably PTSD: 30% of Vietnam vets have Post Traumatic Stress

Disorder. According to Meshad, another problem linked with homelessness is long term effects of traumatic brain injury.

The National Coalition for Homeless Veterans reports HUD estimates that 13% of the homeless population are veterans, approximately 40,000 on a given night. Over a course of the year, however, approximately twice that many are homeless. Another source states that nearly half of the homeless vets served in Vietnam.

I was surprised to learn that many of the homeless vets are women. Women now represent 10% of all veterans. Jaspen Boothe, a woman vet, founded Final Salute Inc. to help homeless women vets.

My concern is that many vets have emotional wounds that are unhealed. And some with physical injuries as well. Many were drafted who didn't want to go, and came home to be vilified for going. They felt alienated from their former life, different from others their own age who had gotten a job or gone to college. Or had dropped out or taken a year to travel. After shooting at people and being shot at and living with the possibility of dying, the vets returned to be around people who didn't understand where they had been or what they had gone through. They came back with bodies still wired to be alert for danger, perhaps even an inability to adjust to the pace of daily life. And fresh in their minds were horrors and experiences that never could be totally forgotten.
