You are supposed to lie on your back in bed at night with this between your legs. Then you wrap two of the Velcro strips around your thighs and two around your ankles.



The "Classmate Abducted" headline refers to the name of the object: "An Abductor." The "Kaiser Authorizes Bondage" refers to the fact that once you are tied up in this device the only way to get out is by bending to reach your ankles, which

is what dislocated my hip in the first place. So either way you are stuck. I call it "Velcro Bondage" Kaiser's assumption is you live with someone who can tie you up and untie you. 
recently, according to average health quality and life expectancy and defined a new criterion that divides human age as follows:






