much about kindergarten, not even the teacher's name. I do have fond memories of Marie O'Bannon, my teacher for both first and second grades. She helped stimulate my passion for books and reading. I was quite disappointed to have to leave her class when we moved in 1953.

The kindergarten met in the old brick building, but my first- and second-grade classes were in what the article calls the "Annex" and which I recollect being called "the portables". I did not realize it was a permanent structure until I read the article and saw the photo. I also recall that one day a chimney fire caused the brick school building to be evacuated. I guess coal - still common in those days - was used to heat the boilers in the heating system. At that time my class was in "the portables", but I believe the kids in the main building had to use the rather intimidating fire escapes on the backside of the structure. The attached photo (perhaps from Spring '51) shows the fire escapes. I'm the kid in the line behind the girl who is adjusting her bonnet.

The second photo, the only other photo I have from that time, was clearly shot at the same event and shows square dancing and the back of the annex. What's interesting to

Correction from the last issue. I am in my 29th year as a docent at the Columbus Zoo – not a doctor. (Editor's note: Dang autocorrect!)



Sargent Elting had the opportunity to sit in the cockpit of an F117 stealth fighter during a training event with Air National Guard units across the country. She was stationed in Savannah, Ga., where the training took place. Sargent Elting is a C2BMO or command and control battle management operation surveillance tech/weapons director. C2BMO airmen are called 'controllers' who literally guide mostly F-15s and F-16s through airspace, tracking weapons ordinance and any other aircraft in the airspace. They use radar, satellite and links to generate the air picture that they look at while on the radio with the crew.

GHMCHS finds

V-Disc (V for Victory) was a record label formed in 1943 to provide well wishes, music and the latest songs for U.S. military personnel. The program was a huge success during World War II. Mulford Road resident **Gloria Zerbe '41** joined the Sammy Kay Big Band after graduation and, at his request, changed her name professionally to Sally Stuart. Robert Louis Stevenson School

from the Grandview Heights Marble Cliff Historical Society



Students at Robert Louis Stevenson School at the corner of First Avenue and Oxley Road participate in the raising of the flag donated by the Daughters of Veterans of the Civil War in this 1928 photograph. The district purchased the land in 1924 and opened the school for first and second grades with a two-room portable building that was originally on the high school site during its construction. Named by the children, R.L. Stevenson School was built in 1926 and initially had 12 rooms (the middle section of the building in the inset 1932 photo). Four rooms were added to each end of the building in 1930, and an annex was built behind it in 1971 to house the kindergarten.



From Abbot to Zuhars

With all GHHS graduates in alphabetical order, Adam Abbot '03 begins the list and it ends with David A. Zubars '56.

Out of 9,857 GHHS graduates from 1916 through 2023, nearly 1% have had the last name of Smith. The names that occur 10 times are a little over 0.1% of all graduates. Many of the names at the beginning of the list are more common names, but may be true partially by the following statement. Most of the smaller numbers are accounted for through large families and extended family and/or many generations remaining in Grandview through the years.

This list was created from our master list of the most common last names, up to 10, among all GHHS graduates. Following Smith with 99 graduates, Jones and Williams tied with 70 graduates, Davis has 64 graduates, Miller has 56 and there were 50 graduates named Anderson.

A memory from Jane Stratton Alspach '45 in a book called Campfire Stories.



By late afternoon, the summer sun was fading and the water level below our suburban cliff was precariously shallow, maybe five feet or less. When I dove, the pool itself finally growled "Enough" and raised up to punish me. I hit bottom and slid forward across the cement. Pulling myself up the ladder revealed my skinless pink belly looking like a grape that had been dragged along rough sandpaper and dipped in red ink. Yep, that was enough. Teri and Dave took a few more turns but the summer had come to an end. A few weeks later we all went back to school.

Distinguished Alumni

Frank "Dude" Higgs



Following high school, Daredevil pilot and Distinguished Flying Cross Frank Higgs played football at Hanover College in Indiana, then transferred to Ohio State University, where he received his Varsity O in golf. He graduated in 1932 and earned the nickname "Dude" in college because of his flashy clothes.

While at OSU, he became good friends with Milton Caniff, creator of the comic strip "Terry and the Pirates." Dude was the inspiration for the comic strip's character "Dude Hennick" as a result of letters later written to Milton during the war in the Far East.

In 1932, while working on his master's degree, Dude was called up. He attended pilot training school and graduated in 1935. He resigned from his commission with the U.S. Army Air Corps in 1937, soon after the start of the Sino-Japanese War.

Following that, he went to China as a military advisor to the Chinese Air Corps and to instruct Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's pilots. He was a charter member of the Chinese National Aviation Corp (CNAC) in 1940. CNAC was operated jointly by the Chinese government and Pan American Airways. He was a senior pilot captain instructor and was under contract to Mme. Chiang Kaishek. He flew many passenger flights in and around China before the Japanese invaded China, and then again after in 1945 when the Japanese surrendered.

Dude was one of the key rescuers of several hundred persons from Hong Kong during the Japanese attack on the city. He piloted the first aircraft, a DC3, to take off for a small airfield 200 miles north of Hong Kong. He and nine other pilots managed to salvage five planes and flew as many people as possible to safety in free China.

On Oct. 20, 1945, Dude was flying the first passenger flight between Shanghai and Canton since 1937, a route he had never flown before. The plane crashed into a mountain and all 28 passengers and three crew were killed.

Dude was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal, World War II Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with four Bronze Service Stars and the Honorable Service Lapel Pin.

Higgs flew Luce and others from Lashio, Burma after the Japanese threatened the eastern coast.



This photo, circa 1922, was taken from a card labeled "Merry Christmas Dude, from the Lindenbergs". Dude is shown in front holding the stuffed toy. The Lindenbergs were from a prominent Marble Cliff family that lived in what was known as the Country Club Subdivision, now Tarpy Woods. Dude was the model for the character Dude Hennick from a popular comic strip "Terry and the Pirates" created by his friend and OSU fraternity brother Milton Caniff. The last strip that Dude was in was published on Christmas Day in 1945, and the original is in the Cartoon Research Library collection at OSU.

Sports Hall of Fame

A banquet was held on Feb. 9 to honor the four newest inductees into the Grandview Heights Sports Hall of Fame. Congratulations to these Bobcat athletes!

Inductees for the 2024 class are Sali Spangler '59, Sarah Meier '11, Ben Graves '06 and Brendan Cox '12

Ben Graves



Ben Graves, a 2006 graduate of Grandview Heights High School, earned 10 varsity letters in tennis, wrestling, basketball, track, and football.

In track as a senior, Ben anchored the 4x200 meter relay to a state qualification, and claimed seventh place in the 300 meter hurdles at the state meet.

For the Bobcat Football team, as a sophomore, Ben made an impact as a defensive back, leading the conference with six interceptions, earning him All-Conference honors. During his junior year, as a wide receiver, he had 46 receptions for 1,038 yards, and scored

11 touchdowns, averaging 22.6 yards per catch.
In his senior season, Ben had 68

receptions for 1,080 yards, which placed him sixth among all wide receivers in the state in 2005. His play helped the Bobcats secure a conference championship, and their first playoff appearance in more than two decades.

Ben's football accolades include: Three consecutive First Team All-MSL, two consecutive First Team All-District awards, two consecutive All-Agonis Columbus Dispatch selections, two consecutive First Team All-Ohio

honors, and was named the Dis-

trict Player of the Year in 2005.
After high school, Ben continued his football career as a wide receiver at Middle Tennessee
State University, and later at Illinois State University, where he was a consistent starter.
He concluded his academic and athletic journey with a Bachelor's degree in Business Management and Quantitative Methods in 2009.

Ben resides in Nashville, Tennessee, where he founded a communication software company used by collegiate and professional sports teams across the country. Ben is married to Maryann Graves, and they have three children: Nefeli, Demetri, and Gianni.

Brendan Cox



Brendan Cox, a 2012 graduate of Grandview Heights High School, was a three-sport athlete, who earned 12 varsity letters and scholar athlete awards in soccer, swimming, and track and field. Brendan was the recipient of the 2012 Ohio High School Scholar Athlete of the Year Award, and Columbus Dispatch Scholar Athlete Award.

A two-time captain for the Bobcat Soccer team, Brendan led the team to an undefeated, 16-0 season in 2010, and led the Cats to a District Championship in 2011, Grandview's first since 2000, and Regional runner-up finish in 2010, as well. He earned multiple soccer awards, including Defensive MVP, and All-Mid State League honors in 2010 and 2011

Brendan is a Grandview Heights High School swimming record holder as the anchor for the 200 meter medley relay, which reached the podium at the 2010 District meet. He also earned the Academic All-American title. As a two-time captain for the Bobcat Track and Field team, Brendan led the team to a Mid-State League title in 2011, a District championship in 2012, Grandview's first since 1989, by winning the 4x800 meter relay and 800 meter run, and reached the podium in the 4x400 meter relay and high jump. He was a state qualifier in the 4x800 meter relay in 2012, and earned All-Mid State League honors in 2010, 2011, and 2012. Brendan continued his track and field career at Missouri University of Science and Technology, competing on the indoor and outdoor teams for four years. He raced in the 400 meter and 800 meter, as well as competing in the high jump and long jump. He earned varsity letters by contributing to the Great Lakes Valley Conference Outdoor Champions in 2014 and 2014, and the indoor runner-up in 2013, 2014, and 2015.

Sports Hall of Fame

Sali Spangler



Sali Spangler, a 1959 graduate of Grandview Heights High School, excelled in varsity basketball, volleyball, baseball, field hockey, badminton, and most notably, tennis

She is highly renowned as being the pioneer of girls sports at Grandview Heights High School. Sali was a tennis champion for Grandview in 1958 and 1959, and also played on the local Junior Whiteman Cup Tennis team from 1956 to 1959.

She was instrumental in the former Girls Athletic Association (G.A.A.), and served as president from 1958-1959. Girls participated and earned points throughout their careers at Grandview, and Sali earned the Thousand-point Meritorious award, which was the highest achievement girls could attain being a member of the G.A.A.

As president of G.A.A. Sali was responsible for the Homecoming decorations, the concession stand at football games, the annual hockey banquet, and helping Grandview's physical education teacher "Miss Pete," who was extremely influential to Sali in various capacities. Sali also participated in several sports that weren't offered at Grandview. She was an avid swimmer, white-water canoeist,

equestrian horseback riding, spelunking in the caves of Kentucky, and one summer, she biked through Europe.

Sarah Meier, a 2011 graduate of Grandview Heights High School, was a two-sport varsity athlete and honor student. In her time at Grandview, she became one of the most decorated female track athletes in school history. Sarah set four individual records in the 100-meter dash, 100-meter hurdles, 200-meter dash, and 300-meter hurdles, as well as two relay records in the 4x200 and 4x400 meter relays. She also set the regional record for the 300-meter hurdles in 2011. She was named the MSL Track Athlete of the year in 2010 and 2011, and she qualified for the state track meet three years in a row.

Sarah was also a four-year starter on the Bobcat Varsity Soccer team. She played striker, and was consistently among the team's top scorers.

After graduation, Sarah attended The Ohio State University and graduated with a degree in Education. As a teacher, she coached Grandview Middle School Soccer for a season, and volunteered for the middle school running club. Sarah resides in Columbus with her husband Daniel and their daughters, Eleanor and Ruby. While she did not continue to compete in organized sports after high school, she still enjoys running the occasional 5k or half-marathon, and plays in a recreational soccer league with her friends.


