

From The Pastor

Dear friends,

At this time of year, I always find myself thinking about how to use the things that are entrusted to my care. It's probably hard wired into my DNA by my farming ancestors, who were concerning themselves with the state of the root cellar and how much hay and firewood they would need to get through the winter. I have a few tomatoes and peppers left in the garden, and I admit to a few hours devoted to canning and freezing food for winter, but no worries about the hay and firewood. My mind, influenced today by severe storms due to climate change and a very divisive political race, turns more to other kinds of resources.

For example, what am I doing with my gratitude? Am I grateful for things my family and friends enjoy, like good jobs, warm living quarters, a neighborhood more tolerant than many parts of the country, and loved ones? We live in the fallacy of thinking that when bad things happen, they cancel out good gifts from God and make them less good. We might even feel guilty thinking about our blessings while others are mourning hate crimes and random violence in their neighborhoods. But the truth is, the more people who notice the warmth, light and love around them, the harder it is for someone to think that hate is the way to make their mark. The more people notice the help they receive during a storm, the more they want to help.

What am I doing with the resource of my desire to help? Working with the congregation, I have several upcoming opportunities. The Peacemaking Offering, taken on World Communion Sunday, helps the denomination to fund peacemaking efforts around the world. We are donating 25% locally to try to address the unequal experience of kids, since some families can and some can afford food for weekend meals. In November, we begin packing for Food for Kids.

What are we as a church doing with the resource of our building? We worship God in an open and welcoming way, study the Bible, and share our space with a Haitian congregation. We let in groups that meet regularly, who teach their members to rely on a higher power or do their duty to God. We directly influence the children of Washingtonville by sharing our faith with them at Vacation Bible Camp. We have been seeing that talking with one another is a good step to community peace, so we exploring how our hall can be used for community gatherings that need a place to happen.

Have you noticed how when you are doing something you love, time flies by and even the most strenuous activity seems like no trouble at all? Let so love God in that way, and work for His purposes with gratitude and joy.

From the PCUSA Website: õThe Peace & Global Witness Offering supports the peacemaking and reconciliation efforts of the church at every governing body level and provides an opportunity to witness to God's gift of peace in the world. 25% of this offering is retained by congregations for support of their own peace and reconciliation efforts.ö We will be giving our 25% gift to Food For Kids.

October 27 is Reformation Sunday. Presbyterians celebrate the tradition that grounds their faith on Reformation Sunday. It is always the last Sunday in October, marking the occasion in 1517 when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany.

Looking a bit to November, on November 3, we will be observing the Lordøs Supper. It is also the end of Daylight Saving Time, so donøt forget to õfall back.ö

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



THE SAVVY SOULS SISTERS OF SYNTAX

"The Covenant of Water" by Abraham Verghese



Spanning the years 1900 to 1977, The Covenant of Water is set in Kerala, on South Indiaøs Malabar Coast, and follows three generations of a family that suffers a peculiar affliction: in every generation, at least one person dies by drowningô and in Kerala, water is everywhere. At the turn of the century, a twelve-year-old girl from Keralaøs long-existing Christian community, grieving the death of her father, is sent by boat to her wedding, where she will meet her forty-year-old husband for the first time. From this unforgettable new beginning, the young girlô and future matriarch, known as Big Ammachiô will witness unthinkable changes over the span of her extraordinary life, full of joy and triumph as well as hardship and loss, her faith and love the only constants.

A shimmering evocation of a bygone India and of the passage of time itself, The Covenant of Water is a hymn to progress in medicine and to human understanding, and a humbling testament to the difficulties undergone by past generations for the sake of those alive today. It is one of the most masterful literary novels published in recent years.

The Savvy Soul Sisters of Syntax will be reading this book in October. Our meeting to discuss the book will be in November.

A fire burned Balsora Baptist Church to the ground. As emergency workers and community members gathered after the blaze subsided, they were surprised to see a charred cross standing upright amidst the smoke and ashes in the air. A firefighter commented that the fire õtook the structure, but not the cross. [This is a reminder] that the building was just that, a building. The church is the congregation.ö

The church is not a building, but a community united by the cross of Christô the One who died, was buried, and rose again. When Jesus lived on earth, He told Peter Heød build His worldwide church, and nothing would destroy it (Matthew 16:18). Jesus would gather believers from all over the globe into a group that would continue throughout time. This community would face intense difficulty, but theyød ultimately endure. God would dwell within them and sustain them (Ephesians 2:22).

When we struggle to establish local churches only to have them stagnate and sputter, when buildings are destroyed, or when we're concerned about believers struggling in other parts of the world, we can remember that Jesus is alive, actively enabling God's people to persevere. We're part of the church He's building today. He's with us and for us. His cross remains.
