# 37th Graduation Set for June 24th; Kaplan, Flinkstrom To Address Convo

Commencement Day, Saturday afternoon June 24, 1967, will gather 672 seniors for the last time in a body to receive their diplomas.

The Sewanhaka football field in the back campus will be the setting for the outdoor commencement exercises at which parents and officials will be present. President of the Senior Class, Gerard Shields will give the welcoming speech to the assembled graduates and guests.

Commencement introducation speeches are scheduled for delivery by Steven Kaplan and Susan Flinkstrom, and various administration and department personnel in the opening phase of the program. The proud members of the graduating class will be given their diplomas by Acting District Principal, Mr. Howard W. Nordahl and Mr. Nadler, president of the Board of Education.

The procession from the gym where all seniors will assemble is to begin at 4:00 P.M., after which time no more guests will be admitted and the parking field will be officially closed.

In the event that threatening weather should warrant postponement of the exercises, they will be reSunday, June 25, on the campus, If on Sunday rain should again upset the plans, diplomas will be presented in two graduation program exercises at 4:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. respectively in the auditorium. The first group of graduates are those whose surname run from A to K, and the L to Z group will follow. The radio stations which normally carry snow announcements for the district will announce any postponements of graduation, if necessary.

Seniors are to be present for the rehearsal planned for Friday afternoon, June 16 at 1:12 P.M. when all seniors are to report to the auditorium.

To date the Senior Class is planning to give five tickets to each graduate, only two of which will be usable in case of inclement weather. Tickets will be distributed along with caps and gowns between 3:00 P.M. and 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, June 22nd in specially designated homerooms.

Senior class head advisor, Miss Mable Oestrich has outlined the appropriate dress to be worn by

shirts, dark ties, dark trousers and dark shoes for the boys, and white dresses, no crinolines, and white heeled shoes for the girls.



## Academic Leader

Graduation is only a few weeks away, and most of the 672 seniors have made fairly definite plans as to what they are going to be doing after finishing high school.

To find out just what these are, the Chieftain has asked all seniors to tell their plans, whether they are going to colleges, to work, or into the armed forces. About 87% of the 672 members of the Class of '67 responded, and their answers showed the following results.

About one half, a total of more than 320, plan to go on to college, or to some sort of advanced training such as business school. Thirtynine boys plan to enter some branch of the armed services, with the Navy taking the greatest number, nineteen. The Air Force is next with ten, and the Army, Marines and Coast Guard came in third, fourth, and fifth, with six, three and one respectively.

The remaining seniors, just under half, will be working next year. Secretarial work is by far the largest category, with beauty culture second. About twenty-five other lines of work were mentioned by those who will be in the business world come September.

Others Foresee Employment, Service

Of those going to college, all but about 20 had definite knowledge of which school they will attend. One hundred different colleges were mentioned, but only 25 of them will be attended by more than one Sewanhakan.

By far the largest group going to college is the 82 students enrolling in Nassau Community College in Garden City. The State Agricultural and Technical Institute at Farmingdale will receive 40 Sewanhakans, the second largest group. Thirteen will attend Hofstra in Hempstead, 11 will attend Queens College and eight will attend Brooklyn Polytechnical Institute. Adelphi will receive five, along with the Fashion Institute of Technology. Cornell, the Uni-versity of Miami, and New York Institute of Technology in Westbury will all receive four. Eight places of higher education will each be the enrolling point of three Sewanha-kans. They are Kansas State Teachers College, City College of New York, SUNY at Binghamton (Harpur College), University of Buffalo, Voorhees Technical Institute, RCA Institute, Nassau Hospital Radiology School and St. John's University.

Two Sewanhakans will attendeach of fourteen additional colleges and schools of higher education, and about 75 others will be attended by

only one Sewanhakan. Following is an alphabetical listing of the seniors who answered the Chieftain questionaire, and a rundown of their plans for next year. (Continued on page 4)
