Girl Leader Corps Holds Mother-Daughter Party

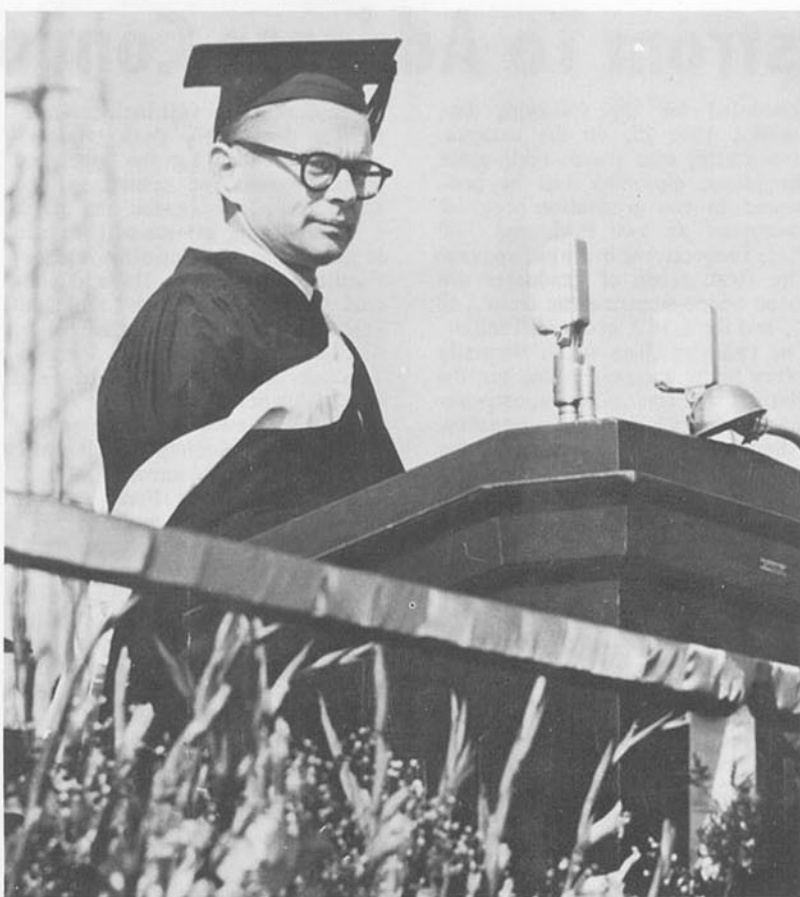
Girls like parties and the GLC group is following suit.

Instruct Women Self Defense Tactics, Tricks

"A simple tube of lipstick, a pocketcomb or a nail file can prove to be useful weapons when attack, assault or rape is imminent," advised Nassau County policemen to an all girl assembly concerning the self-defense of woman on May 24th.

"Women's most valuable weapon is her yell or scream which often frightens away a would-be attacker. This is no time to worry about hurting anyone: use your nails, teeth, spiked heels and pocketbook to defend yourself against attack."

The officer also suggested pleading with the assailant, talking your way out of the situation and offering to make a date for the next evening as alternate methods of fending off an attack.

Self-defense was also discussed in the movie, "Attack." A petite, 100 pound mother demonstrated tactics that any woman could easily maneuver. She illustrated elbow jabs, punching, scratching, kicking as ways of protecting one's self.

A pamphlet distributed listed these suggestions for preventing attack: While driving, keep car doors locked.

When parked, close windows and lock the doors.

Park in lighted areas. If your car breaks down at night, pull to the side of the road, lock yourself in and display a white cloth or marker from the driver's window.

When walking, avoid deserted areas.

Walk in the company of another person.

If traveling by bus or train, arrange to be met by some one on your arrival.

If you are alone in a deserted area, and have cause to worry, attempt to get to the nearest phone and call the police. Whenever possible, try to obtain auto plate numbers.

The police should be notified if strangers ring doorbells and ask vague or strange questions.

Persons without credentials ring doorbells seek employment or attempt to gain admittance to your home to solicit or sell.

Strangers seeking information about your family, or neighbors or their whereabouts.

Receiving a number of phone calls and the caller hangs up when you answer.

Suspicious persons or cars in your neighborhood.

These are the caution, self-defense ideas SHS girls are urged to heed.
