# GEORGE W. CARVER HIGH SCHOOL

African American residents of Warwick County campaigned for new public schools to replace inadequate, overcrowded facilities in the 1930s and 1940s. In 1949 the county opened Carver High School, constructed here at a cost of more than \$500,000. The 20-classroom consolidated school served students in grades 1-11, with grade 12 added in 1955. In July 1958 Carver was incorporated into the Newport News school system. Homer L. Hines, the school's only principal, inspired students to high achievement. Carver High School closed in 1971 as part of the city's desegregation plan, and the building became an intermediate school.

## HUNTINGTON HIGH SCHOOL

Huntington High School (1920 - 1971), named for Industrialist Collis P. Huntington, was the first high school for African American youth in Newport News. It began in a wood building in the 700 block of 18th Street in 1920 with Lutrelle F. Palmer as principal. In 1923, the first brick building was erected at 16th Street and Marshall Avenue. In 1936, 3401 Orcutt Avenue became the final site under Principals Lutrelle F. Palmer, William D. Scales (1943) and Ross M. Hines (1969). Considered one of the most outstanding schools in Virginia, Huntington's "Mighty Vikings" exuded excellence in academics, sports and music. The spirited marching bands were renowned for their famous "Viking Call." In 1971, the 48th and final class was graduated after 51 years of tradition as a symbol of community hope, unity and pride. Huntington became an intermediate school in 1971 and a middle school in 1981.
