#### **First Sunday of Advent**

Some people flip to the end of the book to find out what happens. Do you? Some people roam the internet for spoilers of their favorite show? Do you? We are tempted to know what is going to happen, especially in tension-filled situations. Knowing the ending changes the way in which we experience the angst of the present moment, especially if it's a great ending! Although we anticipate and know the comfort and joy of the Advent season, our Gospel reading from Luke does not begin there. Instead Jesus describes the coming of the Son of Man. His Coming will include moments of dismay, tribulation, assault, fright, and death. Contemplating this time of justice can be fearsome, but it is also a source of joy, because Christ is coming! We know that through Christ we have been redeemed – and that, if we remain faithful to Him, we have the hope of eternal life. As Luke tells us, we can stand with our heads held high because redemption is at hand. Our Advent does not start with comfort and joy, but it sure ends there. Knowing how it will end helps us to have confidence and hope in God. We are encouraged and challenged this first week of Advent by the Word and by our Advent traditions to remember how it ends! In our first reading, the prophet Jeremiah relays consolation to the nation in crisis when God tells them that the days are coming when the Lord will "fulfill the promise." This will bring them much-hoped-for safety and security. In Luke's Gospel, Christ's Coming will be with "power and great glory" and although it sounds somewhat frightening, it will usher in redemption. Those are some spoilers providing great confidence and hope. In addition to our readings, the lighting of our first candle this Advent season is a visual reminder of the culmination of our salvation story! The Light of Christ which has come into the world has and will dispel the darkness. We can stand erect and raise our heads together to glimpse this light of Advent and fill our hearts again with hope that God surely is the one who keeps His promises. That is the best spoiler of all.

### When does the Catholic Church Use Incense?

Incense is used in many Catholic services, including: Masses, Funerals, The consecration of a church or altar, Benediction and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, and Solemn celebrations of the Divine Office.

### Why does the Catholic Church Use Incense?

Catholics use incense for a variety of reasons, including:

- **Prayer**: Incense is a prayer in itself, and the smoke rising from the censer symbolizes prayer rising to God.
- Solemnity: Incense adds a sense of mystery and solemnity to Mass.
- **Connecting with heaven**: The smell and smoke of incense can remind us of heaven and help us enter into the presence of God.
- Honoring the deceased: At funerals, incense is used to honor the deceased.
- **Sacrifice**: Incense is offered as a sacrifice to God, similar to how it was offered in the Temple in Jerusalem.

# What If I Am Sensitive to Incense?

- Our Parish of St Francis of Assisi is cognisant of your sensitivity and so advertises in the Weekly Parish Bulletin where and when incense is used (see schedule of Masses above).
- Please note that only occasionally at SFA is it used on <u>Sundays or at Christmas and New</u> <u>Year</u> solemnities, it is not used at any of our other two churches in our cluster (SHJ & SJM) except at funerals.
- If attending SFA when incense is used, you may wish to sit at the back of the church, away from the sanctuary.
